<u>Resilient Food Systems Infrastructure</u> (RFSI) Program Grants Due March 6

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is accepting applications for two Wisconsin Resilient Food Systems Infrastructure (RFSI) Program grants through 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, March 6, 2024.

The two RFSI grants, the Infrastructure Grant and the Equipment-Only Grant, are funded through a cooperative agreement between DATCP and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS). A total of \$27 million is available in grant funding.

RFSI grant projects must expand middle-of-the food supply chain capacity for locally, and regionally, produced foods and offer more and better market opportunities to small and mid-sized agricultural producers, including those who may not have access to value-added opportunities or processing to meet market demand for premium or value-added products, such as underserved producers.

There are two applications: one for the equipment grant (no cost share) and one for an Infrastructure grant (50% cost share). There is separate criteria for each.

Please let us know if you need additional information or help filling out the grant applications. Note the scoring section to ensure you have the most points you can. These are competitive grants so the quality of your proposal and application will definitely matter as does making sure you receive as many scoring points as possible. We are here to help you in any way we can.

Wisconsin Dairy Products Association Executive Director Amy Winters weighed in this month on the debate of dairy remaining in the USDA's Dietary Guidelines that are <u>currently under</u> <u>review</u>. Vegan Navajo Nation past President and Arizona Congressional candidate Jonathan Nez and vegan activist group, <u>Physicians Committee for Responsible Medicine</u>, are asking the review committee to remove dairy from the guidelines calling the inclusion racist due to many indigenous people being lactose intolerant.

New Legislative District Maps

Maps Written by Governor Evers Passed the State Legislature This Month Find Out If Your Legislative District and Legislators Are Changing

Wisconsin's passage this month of new legislative maps could change not only your legislative districts but also the political control of the State Assembly.

It is estimated that 21% of the state's adults could have new political representation in the state Assembly during the upcoming election.

The Senate, currently with a 22-11 republican supermajority, is expected to remain in republican control during the 2024 election cycle.

Marquette University used computer modeling to estimate that 42 assembly districts favor democrats by more than 10 percentage points and another 4 by single digits. 46 seats favor republicans by more than 10 percentage points and another 7 by single digits. It really could be a close race in many of the newly drawn districts. Milwaukee Journal Sentinel projections estimate that over 120,000 eligible voters in previously secure republican districts have been redrawn into new districts expected to tilt towards the Democratic Party in the upcoming elections.

The impact of these changes will ultimately depend on factors such as current incumbents remaining where they are or moving into a newly drawn district, voter turnout, the effectiveness of political campaigns and the presidential election which could increase voter turnout and party line voting.
