Resilient Food Systems Infrastructure (RFSI) Program Grants

The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is accepting applications for two Wisconsin Resilient Food Systems Infrastructure (RFSI) Program grants through 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, March 6, 2024.

The two RFSI grants, the Infrastructure Grant and the Equipment-Only Grant, are funded through a cooperative agreement between DATCP and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS). A total of \$27 million is available in grant funding.

RFSI grant projects must expand middle-of-the food supply chain capacity for locally- and regionally-produced foods and offer more and better market opportunities to small- and mid-sized agricultural producers, including those who may not have access to value-added opportunities or processing to meet market demand for premium or value-added products, such as underserved producers.

In 2023 Wisconsin had exports of \$3.87 billion in agricultural products, down from \$4.22 billion in Agricultural products 2022.

The USDA Outlook for U.S. Agricultural Trade November 2023 report forecasts federal fiscal 2024 exports will be down nearly \$2.5 billion from 2023, or 5.1%.

2023 Export Highlights

Of the \$3.87 billion in agricultural products exported, Dairy: cheese, whey, lactose, and milk proteins accounted for 13% of all Wisconsin agricultural exports. Wisconsin is number one in the U.S. for the export of specialty cheeses and, dairy bovine genetics.



Agricultural Exports to China are Expected to Decrease in 2024 as They Continue to Push for Agricultural Independence.

In 2023, China imported a total of 2.6 million tonnes of dairy products, representing a 12% decrease compared to the previous year.

This decrease stems, in part, from the country's ongoing efforts to achieve agricultural self-sufficiency.

China has been implementing policies aimed at bolstering its domestic agricultural production. This includes investments in technology, infrastructure, and subsidies to support local farmers. By prioritizing domestic production.

By prioritizing domestic production, China aims to improve food security, reduce reliance on foreign imports, and mitigate potential risks associated with external disruptions to the global food supply chain.

With only 5 countries accounting for the majority of our exports here in Wisconsin, continuing to diversify and open new markets such as Taiwan, Nigeria and Indonesia are essential.

If unaddressed, the challenge of trade agreements and sustaining markets amidst competitive pressures could significantly affect our export economy. It is imperative that we undertake measures to bolster our trade agreements and open new markets.

Assembly Bill 655	creates a "transition to grass pilot program" and grants to farmers who are implementing livestock grass-based managed grazing systems	Passed Assembly Committee. Senate companion bill introduced.	Support
Assembly Bill 952	Under this bill, no person may label a food product as, or sell or offer for sale a food product that is labeled as, any type of milk unless the food product is cow's milk or hooved or camelid mammal's milk or a type of milk that meets certain specifications under federal law	Introduced and referred to the Assembly Committee on Agriculture.	We support the correct labeling of dairy products but have concerns with the way this bill language is drafted.
